
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### Placement

- 34 hours a week
  - Traditionally over 4 and a half days a week
- Have clinical liaison and personal tutor for each site
- Visited every 2-3 weeks by personal tutor
- Must achieve a minimum 80% attendance to qualify
- Continuously assessed with competencies over the year





Placement rotated between a minimum of 2, colour matched, sites


The train won't get me there for an 8.30 start




### Background & Overview of Research

- Previous research Koch et al conducted a study with nursing students in 2014 which concluded that being male and having English as a second language may lead to a less positive placement experience. More work was also needed in other areas such as, mature students, students with a lack of previous work experience, financial constraints, parental status, ethnicity, religious belief, sexual orientation and students with a special need or disability.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> year Diagnostic Radiography students
- Questionnaire
- Response rate 31 respondents 28% of cohort
- Thematic analysis






### Responsibilities outside of studies




# How do these affect your placement experience?

- 39% stated that their personal circumstances had an effect on their experience of placement.
- Part time working
  - Not enough time to make extra money
- Carers
  - Cost
  - Opening hours/pick up time
- Travel
  - Time
  - Tiredness/lack of motivation
  - Work/life balance




### Travel



 50% of students had negotiable working hour and 50% were non-negotiable. This may mean changing start/finish times or working an extended day.

## Themes and Discussion

- Travel
  - Time
  - Tiredness/lack of motivation
- Work/life balance
- Equity
  - Some students had car, only 20 mins to drive and had negotiable start times.



### Conclusion and Recommendations

- Commitments and responsibilities not gender, age, ethnicity
- Follow up interview to further unpick themes
- Flexible Working continue to work with clinical partners
- Placement allocation process review
- More emphasis on student resilience
